
An Interview with Our Principal

Have you ever wondered what it takes to be a principal? Are you curious about our new building on campus? In this edition of the firefly, we are lucky to have an interview with the man himself, our principal. We sat down with Principal (Liu, Yung-Shun), and asked him some of the questions that are on Yan Ping students'minds. We received some very interesting answers. If you'd like to know what we discovered, read the following interview.





Q: Why did you want to become a principal?



A: When I was younger, I had no intention of getting involved in education. I was the first-born son, and my family was poor. Sadly, my father died when I was in college. As a result, I was obligated to find a job to support my many brothers, sisters and my mother. This was really tough, for I was only a mere college student at the time.

At this point, an assistant professor recommended that I become the dean of students at a junior high school. As you know, sometimes the wrong path can take you to the correct destination. I found out that education was my true calling. I realized that I enjoyed working with children. After discovering this, I was determined to take the exam and get my teaching license. Life sometimes forces us to make difficult decisions, but sometimes we discover that it was all for the best.



Q: What on earth is the principal's job?



A: I want to be honest that being a principal is definitely no easy job. Arranging the courses, hiring new teachers, dealing with financial problems, and most of all, managing a school's unique culture, are all tough tasks. I have to put people in place so that they can utilize their abilities and the school can function as a whole. These tasks alone keep me very busy. On top of that, we are still in the middle of the construction of our new building. Before construction could be started, many problems needed to be solved. Being a principal is a very difficult job.



Q: That does sound like a tough job. Have you ever wanted to quit?



A: I had never even considered quitting until I came to Yanping on February 1, 2012. In the beginning, there were many difficulties I had to face. It took me time to adjust to the new school. I was unfamiliar with the teachers, and there were competing opinions about how the school should be run. These difficulties were very challenging, and I contemplated the idea of leaving. Before coming to Yanping, I was the principle of many public schools. At those schools, I was able to build a sound school system, hire excellent teachers, and help students excel. Yanping was my first private school. I was surprised that the culture was a bit different. The things I had done before that had helped me lead other schools to excellence, weren't working. I wondered why, and I was determined to face every obstacle, shoulder the responsibility and succeed.

Q: We are in the middle of the construction of the new building. Many students wonder about the unique architecture. What's the idea behind the design of a building like this?



A: I believe that every student has discovered the building has a very special appearance. Perhaps it may seem a bit strange to you right now, but there are many reasons for the design. Long before construction, the board of directors and I had been planning a major refurbishment of the school. Renovations are never easy, especially when you're renovating a school that must remain in session. Many things had to be taken into consideration. Despite the difficulties, I never flinched. Over the past 28 years, I've cultivated my perseverance. The first obstacle was the space. The use of space at YP has always been one of our shortcomings. We came up with creative solutions to maximize our use of the space we have. We built vertically to minimize the building footprint. Rooftop gardens allow students to have a place to hang out and get some fresh air. We even extended the track and other areas for physical education, so that they go under part of the new building.

Our second concern was the use of technology. Technology is improving at tremendous speed. This provides new ways to teach and new teaching aids. Figuring out ways to integrate technology into the new building was very important for us. This technology will help YP become a better place to learn.

After much time and discussion, the blueprint for the new building was finally settled. The new building has more green spaces, a modern shape and appearance and most of all it resembles a firefly. The firefly is the symbol for Yanping. When the gymnasium is finally completed, the shape of the two parts of the building will look like a firefly from above. The completion of this new building and the renovations to the campus will be an important milestone in our long history.



Q: What's the most heartwarming thing students have done?



A: Students have done many heartwarming things. I remembered that there were students willing to spend their time to help manage a great graduation ceremony. In addition, there are benevolent students who spent their summer vacation volunteering in Yilan and Hualien. They really helped the people in those communities. There are many things worth encouraging.

After this Q&A, I believe that all of you have more understanding of our principal and Yanping. This is the last year the principal can take good care of us. After he retires, never forget what he has taught us—be modest all the time. Thanks for reading.

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
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The New School Building

The ink ran swiftly through the fiber, blooming like a devilish flower. I felt as if I was stained by the fatal mistake.

"Sometimes, I actually prefer writing on cheaper paper, so I can write without the fear of making mistakes." my calligraphy teacher said as his hand maneuvered confidently across the paper. As I stood by him and observed closely, my mind flashed back to that piece of paper and the ink stain in the center.

"How can you always write with such perfection at once?" I asked my teacher. He laughed and went into the store, coming out with a scroll of calligraphy in his hand.

"How many versions of this same piece do you think I wrote?" The traces of the strokes indicated their fast movement.

"Two?" He shook his head with a grin. "Three?" He shook his head again, with a wider smile. "Five?" He clapped his hands and let out a laughter.





"Wow, it took you five..." as I was flabbergasted to learn how many times my teacher wrote the same piece, he whispered with calmness, "Ten. It took me ten times to get the version that I was satisfied with."

As a perfectionist, I have always expected myself to be perfect at once. In reality, no one, not even my teacher, can reach perfection straightaway. I had always deemed mistakes as stumbling blocks, but they turned out to be stepping stones. Every piece of perfect work people see has been shaped by pieces of imperfections and errors. Sure, we all aim for perfection, but we should never let it become the excuse for avoiding failure. We are still a blank canvas and have plenty of space to make mistakes, and only through trial and error will one be able to truly reach perfection. After all, no masterpiece can be created overnight; those who failed and learned piece by piece are the ones who become true masters.

I used to spend too much time perfecting every letter and mending every tiny imperfection, but always ended up with lifeless words. From that day on, I tried hard to fight against my fear of failure. I still have doubts, but I push myself to go against my instinct to shrink back. Whenever I make a mistake, I use the rest of the paper to practice the same character again and again until it feels right. The process can be monotonous, but I enjoy seeing my gradual progress. After years of repeated failure and practice, I finally feel confident writing down the first letter and bracing myself for potential mistakes.

Before learning calligraphy, I had always been overly cautious in the fear of making any minor mistakes. After repeated failure and practice, however, I grew to realize that no progress can be made by sitting there and worrying about mistakes that haven't even occurred. I forced myself to be comfortable going straight at everything I do, and the mindset helped me in every aspect of life. I'm still a perfectionist, but now I know that perfections can only be achieved through accumulated imperfections.

Recently, while I was sorting out my creations, I compared my works throughout the years that I learned calligraphy. In the old ones, the letters were stiff with hesitance; in newer works, the thick strokes were like rough waves, bold and unconstrained. However, the smooth traces of every stroke did not appear out of thin air; it was the mistakes and practice that pushed me forward, bit by bit. When I almost finished sorting out the works, I spotted a blank piece of paper sticking out from the bottom of the stack. As I pulled it out, I recognized that it was the gridded paper, the failure that I was too afraid to face. It had been laying at the bottom of the pile of paper for years as if it had been waiting for me to discover its existence. Staring at the black stain in the middle, I took a deep breath and spread the paper on my desk. I dipped the brush into the ink, feeling more confident than ever. Holding the brush firmly in my hand, I knew I was ready, ready for my next mistake.



Through the airplane window, skyscrapers of Taipei had gradually become smaller and smaller, and finally changed into little sprinkle dots. After an eight-hour flight, twenty Taipei students arrived at Gold Coast, Australia with high spirits. Glad to be selected as one of the group members



who won the intense competition and became a leader of Taipei high school students, I not only met a lot of Taipei students who can express themselves well in English, I also found out several impressive differences between Taipei and Gold Coast.

Both similarities and differences exist between Taiwanese culture and that of Australia. Take aboriginal culture for example. On the first day of our study tour, we went to Dreamworld, the biggest theme park in Australia. To my surprise, the whole amusement park was full of aboriginal elements. On the wildlife island in the theme park, the place was decorated with aboriginal patterns like koalas and kangaroos, and in the dining area, the sound of "didgeridoo", the musical instrument of Australian aborigines, accompanied us during lunch time. In the English class we attended on weekdays, we learned a lot about Australian aboriginal legends and we even made our



own dot painting, which was filled with Aussie features. What I felt throughout the trip is that aboriginal culture is one of the characteristics which Australians are proud of. I believe that Taiwanese aboriginal culture has the same potential. I think what needs to be done is to put more emphasis on our own culture, so that the aboriginals could be regarded as one of the highlights of Taiwan.

We also visited a lot of universities on the Coast like Bond, Griffith, and Southern Cross University. The universities welcome students across the globe to become international students, and each university has its own popular schools,





which are usually law, business, or tourism. We also visited vocational schools. For instance, Tafe provides a professional training environment for students to learn what they will do in their future careers in restaurants, hair salons, and hospital wards for nursing students. Meanwhile New York Film Academy trains students to become directors or actors, and Airways Aviation even has real planes and helicopters for their students to actually take flight into the blue sky! In my opinion, the core value of Australian education system emphasizes international world view and vocational education. This is what Taiwan can learn from Australia, and I believe we can improve our own higher education.

As for the secondary education, we went to Emmanuel College and took some classes with the students there. Although we were supposed to have classes in two different subjects, I was placed into humanity class twice by accident, one was for junior high school, and the other was for seniors. This accident gave me the opportunity to compare the classes of different grades in Australia. In the junior high school class, the teacher taught about ancient Rome, and we worked on the sheet that told us to imagine if we were Roman citizens, and then compared it to our lives today. While in the senior high school class, the content and atmosphere were more serious and professional. I was fascinated with the vivid situation set for the junior high school class and their expertise taught to the seniors. After experiencing the Aussie teaching and learning environment,



I hope that my high school, Yanping, or the education in Taiwan, can integrate our system with Australia's teaching method, which is combining knowledge learning, creativity, and the skill of critical thinking.

Besides schools, life in Gold Coast is so amazing that it contains both outdoor activities and urban experiences. Our group stayed with several homestay families during our tour. On the weekend, our homestay parents would bring us out separately to have authentic Australian experiences. Some of us went to shopping malls and bought a lot of souvenirs back to Taiwan, some went to Warner Bros. Movie World for the whole day, some went to watch their homestay brother's rugby game, and some even went hiking in the evening for stargazing. The time we stayed with our homestay family made our tour unique from person to person, and it was truly a great way for us to know what it felt like to be in an Aussie family.

All in all, I love my Aussie experience and there will probably be another study tour to Gold Coast next year because of the sister city relationship between Taipei and Gold Coast. I learned and improved myself a lot from this study tour, so I hope that students from grade nine to twelve can enthusiastically join the selecting competition and get the chance to visit this gorgeous city!



An Educational Trip to Japan

What is your first impression of Japan? The cute characters of Disneyland, ancient temples, or mouth-watering sushi and ramen? This winter vacation, I went to Tokyo and Nagano for a memorable educational trip with Yanping.

The activity on the itinerary I'm most impressed with was our visit to Ueda high school. Ueda is a school surrounded by beautiful plum blossoms and gorgeous buildings. When we arrived there, the students there rolled out the red carpet to welcome us. In the beginning of our exchange were speeches from the two principals and student representatives. Afterwards, both sides introduced their school history and academic affairs. Then the two schools started their performances. For our performance we sang a song called "The Wind Rises." It was originally sung by a Taiwanese singer named Wu Qing Feng. The reason that we picked this song is because it was adapted from a popular theme song in a Japanese drama. We had practiced this song for almost two months, and we also practiced its Japanese lyrics for students in Ueda. Although memorizing foreign lyrics was exhausting, at the

sight of their applause and satisfied facial expressions, I felt a sense of fulfillment. The performance Ueda carried out was a dance by their dance club. To our great astonishment, the dance performance was marvelous. In spite of the sheer number of members involved in the dance, their moves



were well-synced, and the choreography of the dance was cute and vigorous. It's no wonder that they won a silver medal in the national competition.

The fourth part was our report about SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations). The concept we chose was "Ocean Waste, and Humanity". We mostly talked about the ocean waste and how Taiwanese government and NGOs have been working on it. We had been preparing this report since October. Both memorizing a four-minute English draft and speaking smoothly were not easy for me, and we had a hard time polishing our manuscript. In order to let the students there understand what we were talking about, we had to replace some advanced vocabulary to easier words and accompany them with pictures occasionally. The most difficult part was devising the questions for the quiz. We taxed our ingenuity designing moderate questions so that they could successfully get the prize we prepared. To our delight, the report was successful, my group members and I cooperated with one another perfectly, and the Japanese students listened to our report attentively and jostled to answer the questions.

Finally, we came to the last part of our exchange—meeting our study partners. Regardless of the awkward atmosphere between my partner and me in the beginning, we chatted joyfully about half an hour later. My partner was a member of the gardening club, and she has already been to Taiwan for the exchange with our school once. I'm glad that she was impressed with Taiwan's delicacy and friendly students.

I really hope more and more people, especially grownups, become concerned about the problems associated with the Internet and work to make the world a better place for teenagers and children.




Three Minutes to Watch a Movie: Dangal

The Nth Room Case

Many people may have thought that 2020 would be a year filled with love because of the Chinese homophonic of "love you". Ironically, by April, there have already been lots of heart-breaking news, such as Kobe Bryant's death, the novel coronavirus, and the Nth room case; the fourth sexual assault case in Korea.

Actually, the Nth room case didn't originate in 2020. It was a sexual crime in Korea that started in the second half of 2018. A reporter unintentionally discovered an app called "Telegram", which is known to be an app with strong privacy settings. He started hiding himself within the app and tried to gather as much evidence as possible for the police. The founder created the "1st room" up to the "8th room", so it's nicknamed "the Nth room". The members needed to upload erotic videos they had or sexual activities they participated in. In addition, the more they paid for, the more videos they could watch. Surprisingly, there were over 260 thousand Koreans watching those cruel videos. A total of 74 confirmed victims included 16 minors with the youngest child being only 11. The main suspect used high-paid part-time job wages to lure the victims into sharing their private pictures, personal information, and successfully forced them to make sexual exploitative videos.

This case wasn't reported until March this year. Many people launched a cosignatory on the Blue House to open the personal information of the suspects and the identities of the members to the public. The former has surpassed over 2.7 million people signatures and the latter has reached 2 million. Therefore, the police opened the suspect's appearances because of the people's rights to know also to avoid similar cases from happening. That was the first time personal information was made public because of sexual crimes in Korea.

With the development of the Internet, people have more opportunities to commit crimes. It also has become the hotbed of sexual crimes, especially against teenagers. After this incident broke out, there are still many people blaming the victims by making comments like "because the girls uploaded those videos first, they became subjects of crime". This is tragic because victim blaming prevents victims from coming out and telling authority of their suffering in fear of having the fault placed on them.

The misogynist culture in Korea also played a role in this case. Korea is profoundly affected by traditional Confucianism, so the system values "women are inferior to men" is deeply rooted in their lives. That really deepened the distinctions between men and women, causing the rise of some radical feminism in Korea. However, the arguments over the status between men and women are still controversial. There is still some rational feminism in Korea, so I think that the nation is going through a transition period now.

The sadness of this incident was not only the suspects' criminal methods but also the people who disregard decency surpassed over 260 thousand. None of them tried to report it to the police for more than a year. Although this incident didn't occur in Taiwan, it isn't far away from us. After this incident, we can ponder whether to make public the identities of the members or suspects of sexual crimes. Does it really guarantee the lives of the victims? Does it really reduce the crimes?

How to Make a Mask Cover

Welcome to home economics class. My name is Ivy, and today I'm going to teach you how to make a mask cover during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Materials you'll need to make a mask cover

- * two pieces of elastic string
- * a piece of waterproof cloth (Make sure you have the correct size)
- * a pair of scissors
- * a ruler
- * a sewing kit

Let's begin!

First, fold your waterproof cloth in half, and then open it. You will see a fold line in the middle. After that, sew 1 centimeter from the dot towards the center. Fold the two sides along. Next, you will see a protrusion in the middle. Flatten it, and you have already finished one third of the work. Now, repeat all of these steps with the breathable cloth. When finished, stack the two pieces of cloth on top of one another, and then sew them together at the top and bottom. If you are worried that the stitches won't look good, choose the color which is similar to the cloth so that they won't be visible.





Second, sew the elastic strings to the mask cover. Turn your mask cover to the breathable cloth side and sew the strings to it at the top and bottom, forming a loop. Then, reinforce your stitching.

Third, sew a mark of your own so that your mask cover is easily recognizable and won't get mixed up with someone else's. You can sew anything you want to the mask, as long as it's recognizable. After this, you're done!

Are you satisfied with your work? Mask covers are quite useful especially during this current pandemic. Once you know how to make it, you don't have to waste as many masks. By putting a normal mask inside of the cover, the mask itself can be used for several days. Lastly, don't forget to clean the mask cover every day by sterilizing it in boiling water or throwing it in the washing machine. Air-dry it afterwards and it will be ready to protect you in no time!




The Virus Standing in the Way to Our Dream

My Pet Dog Woofy






words, sentences, and finally completing an article. That sense of accomplishment is irreplaceable.

patterns, etc. As long as you are willing, your efforts will all pay off in the end.




The Insight into Our Bodies

The ones that water failed to penetrate were arteries, since their semilunar valves prevented water from flowing into ventricles.

Next, I observed the kidneys, which were much less complex than the hearts. I quickly compared them with the pictures in my textbook to refresh my memory of the technical terminology associated with them, and then I moved on to today's main experiment.



Carefully removing three daphnia from three tanks filled with water of different temperatures, my teammates and I nervously held our breath until they finally reached their glass slides intact. To prevent them from being crushed by the cover slip (the top layer of glass), I even used some of my own hair, putting strands on the both sides of the slide to ease the pressure from the cover slip. Despite our best efforts, when I looked through the microscope and spotted the tiny creature, its heart had already exploded it had been crushed! Letting out a sigh of irritation, we had no choice but to start from scratch. However, the failure annoyed me, and filled me with childish impatience. Unsurprisingly, my team killed several daphnia as a result. We learned that haste not only makes waste, but dead daphnia as well. Therefore, we did it again, with patience and care, and eventually succeeded in recording the heart beats of daphnia. Ironically, viewing these tiny creatures felt like a truly Herculean feat!

In retrospect, this experiment was a precious experience. The laboratory was wonderful, and viewing real animal organs in person was totally different from studying pictures in a textbook. For the first time, I was fully immersed in the experiment. I would love to return to the biology laboratory for more experimentation in the future!
